

### Basics of Catholicism Part 103—How does someone become a deacon?


Before I describe the ordination rite for a bishop, I want to take some time to explain how someone gets to become a bishop. The first step is that he needs to become a deacon. We have two types of deacons: permanent and transitional. For this part of the series, I am going to focus on the permanent deacons. Unlike transitional deacons, permanent deacons will almost always remain a deacon for their entire lives. These men are usually married, their children have grown up, and now they would like to start a different type of service for the church. In most dioceses, the bishop requires any man who wants to pursue the permanent deaconate to have older children since service as a deacon is a huge time commitment. But every bishop sets their own rules regarding the requirements for the diaconate.

How does a man become a deacon? First, usually, he meets with his pastor to discuss the possibility of entering into formation to become a deacon. Formation is the process through which a man is prepared intellectually, spiritually, pastorally, and relationally for this service in the church. If his pastor agrees that he would be a good candidate and agrees to sponsor him, he applies to the diocese for entrance into the deacon formation program. In our diocese, the first year is called a propaedeutic or preyear where the candidates get to meet each other, spend some time exploring the diaconate and ministry in the church, and discern whether they would like to continue. The formation program is usually about 5 years long and encompasses the study of theology, spirituality, the church, prayer and liturgical formation, practice in ministry, and coming to know themselves. The wives of the candidates also must complete the program with their husbands, unless he doesn't have a wife.

Once they have completed the 5 years of formation, they are called to orders. At this point, the bishop sends them an official letter indicating that he is willing to ordain the man to the order of the deacon. At a Mass of Ordination in the Cathedral, he is ordained a deacon for the service of the church. The deacon then assists the pastor or his bishop in sacramental as well as practical matters in the church. Following his ordination to the diaconate, he cannot be married even upon the death of his wife.

The life of a permanent deacon is quite different from a transitional deacon. Transitional deacons are those men who are studying to become priests and must be ordained a deacon before being ordained a priest. Since permanent deacons can own property, usually have jobs outside the church, and have families, they live more stable lives than a priest would. Bishops rarely move permanent deacons since they would have to sell and buy a house, move their families, and find new careers. Thus permanent deacons serve an important roles in churches by giving some stability to sacramental ministry as well as practical matters. Deacons can also serve as administrators of parishes, financial officers, OCIA directors, adult formation, and more.
