

Basics of Catholicism Part 104—How do you become a priest?


The process of becoming a priest is much more extensive than becoming a permanent deacon. Generally, the process of discerning a call to the priesthood begins in the local parish. Most people do not realize the effect of parishioners on a man discerning a call to become a priest. The level of involvement they allow, their prayer support, the strength of the community are some of the factors that help a man discern a call. Yet, the number one greatest factor is the priest the man grew up with. The vast majority of men who are called to be a priest can trace their interest to a priest they knew that inspired them. Whether a man continues to discern and is willing to enter seminary is largely dependent on his family and his local church. I want to stress the importance of the local parish community in helping men discern a call to the priesthood.

Once he has an inkling towards the priesthood, he begins a process called discernment. Discernment involves many different aspects of his life which aid in helping him answer the question: is God calling me to be a priest? Most men like to become more involved in their church, take on ministries and roles, and use these opportunities to explore the possibility of leadership in the church. Prayer is a critical component. Spending time in personal prayer, active involvement in liturgical prayer, coupled with spiritual direction are necessary for proper discernment. At some point in this process, the man feels that God is calling him to be a priest. At this point he contacts the Vocation Director for his diocese and begins the application process. The application process includes a psychological evaluation, physical examination, and meetings with the bishop, the seminary, and the diocesan board. If all of these tests and groups approve of him, he is then accepted to seminary.

Seminary is a continuation of the discernment process. Through his theological and philosophical studies, pastoral ministry, spiritual formation, and human formation, he continues to discern with the Church whether he is called to be a priest. That last part is very important. The call to become is priest is not limited to the individual man but is a process involving the church. Does the Church want this man as a priest? Will he care for her and provide for the flock? Seminary is meant to continue this formation in union with the Church.

Many people wonder about seminary and what happens there. The first year of most seminaries is called a propaedeutic year meaning that the first year is meant for prayer and discernment. This helps the man discern properly before continuing with the rest of the discernment process. After the first year, he has a combination of philosophy and theology classes, spiritual conference and days of spiritual formation, an assignment outside of seminary to help grow his pastoral skills, and lives with the other seminarians developing his interpersonal skills. Each year he works with a formation director who guides and evaluates his process including giving recommendations and recommending whether he continues. If his bishop, vocation director, and formation director believe in his call to become a priest, he advances to the next year. Continuing to advance each year for seven years until ordination to a priest.
