### **Basics of Catholicism Part 114—All-Male Priesthood**

Now we begin a far more useful and exciting exploration in the value and importance of the priesthood being limited to men.

The Church as a Family:

One of the greatest reasons for the all-male priesthood is the balance of gender in the Church. I know, I'm guessing that most people are raising their eyebrows at me if not completely dismissing me at the moment. Remember: The Church is feminine and our mother. The priest holds a special role as the spouse of the Church. Bishops show this spiritual reality more prominently through wearing a ring and through their role in the Church. Yet, priests mirror some of this reality. In the words of Gensis, "man is not meant to be alone." Priests are not loners who want to live without a family or children. Priests are men who see such great value in family and children that we are willing to give them up for the sake of the parish family. The femininity of the Church is balanced by the masculinity of the priest. Pope Francis emphasized the need for women to show the beauty and femininity of the Church. When a priest has too much control over of the interior of the Church, it becomes sterile and lifeless. Women give the Church a special beauty and elegance which keeps both genders in balance. In a similar way, a priest's title of "father" illustrates the familial role of the priest and his connection to the larger body of the Church.

As a side note, imagine a woman pastor in the Catholic Church. I can easily imagine it because one of my friends is a Lutheran pastor. As you look around the Church, the interior is feminine, the leadership is feminine, and the identity of the Church is feminine. Where is the role for men? The challenge for us today is that we have not expressed both genders equally in our churches in order to see the beauty and value of both come alive and be well-represented. The challenge that women should become priests, should also call us to ask the question: what is the role of a woman in the church? What is the role of man in the church? What are the gifts that each bring?

#### Jesus as a man:

The Church teaches that our goal is to do as Jesus taught and gave us. Often today we want to dismiss the value of gender and make everyone genderless as though maleness and femaleness are social constructs and not rooted in our identity. Jesus is male. The priest is his representative, his face, his presence in the world. If our goal is to do as Jesus gave and taught us, then we also have to mirror him. Since Jesus was male, his priests are also male. Therefore, we have an all- male priesthood to match the maleness of Jesus.
